Although Hillsdale freshman guard Jerry Tharp topped all scorers with 29 points, including six three-pointers, this game was decided in the paint. By halltime, three Chargers had reached double-ligures in scoring: center Jim Bauer (15), forward Greg Martin (14) and Tharp (15). In simple terms, Hillsdale moved the ball well, found the open man, and burled everything. When the inside was clogged, the ball went out to Tharp for a three-pointer.

Joining Tharp in double-figures in scering for Hillsdale were Bauer (22), Martin and Steve Dunning (19 cach), and Terry Sines (16). Sines topped all rebounders with 14, For St. Mary's, Greg Spragglas scored 22, with Butcher getting 20, Qasawa 13 and Mike Belezak 12.

Oakiand Community College's hunt for a second-straight NJCAA Division II mens basketball champi-onship lasted three days and three

After knocking off Alpena CC 80-74 last Wednesday (March 2) and Grand Rapids JC 88-78 Thursday, the Raiders went up against Sinclair CC of Dayton, Ohlo, on Friday, the Region XII host and No. 2-ranked team in the NJCAA. The game turned in the Ilnaid 40 seconds on an OCC turnover and free-throw shooting, as Sinciair prevailed, 94-85.

It was a disappointing end to season that over reached expectations after last year's Division II champlionship. OCC finished 24-8, although five of its top six players returned.
