Because of an aging World Wart is a boiler used to bely heat the school, "On one side it's 50 (degrees) and in another side it's 60," said Ralph Skrockl, assistant superincident for business.

A building renovation committee of several board of education members, principals, the district mainte-

nance supervisor and Skrocki toured the school to examine building prob-lems. The district includes part of southeast Farmington Hills.

Skrocki said it's too early to estimate the total cost of needed improvements or to say when the district might place a millage request on the ballot.

A preliminary list of improvements at various schools suggests new heating systems, making build-

ings more energy efficient, resurfac-ing parking lots, replacing floor coverings and more.

Improvements will be ranked by importance, first of which will be their health and safety value. "Anything that has to do with the health and safety of our students and staff will be a highest priority," Skrocki said.

Second, improvements that aid ed-ucation will be considered and, third, functional improvements.

Minor improvements are already being made, Skrocki said. Other im-provements — depending on avail-
