HE BUILDERS Home Flower and Furniture Show will open its doors at Cobo Hall for the 70th time March 19-27.

Here you'll be able to see the first blossoms of spring, smell the choco-lately aroma of fresh fudge, be fasci-nated by the best selfnated by the barker's demonstrations of the home products, register to win a variety of prizes, vote for your dream - and almost hear the pounding of the carpenter's nails as you view

idea after idea for home renovations.

Sponsors of the show is the 1,500-member Builders Association of Southeastern Michigan, who host the show each spring as a public service.

This year's show features six "real"

This year's show leatures six "real" manufactured homes on display by Keating Community Homes, Inc., of Bloomfield Hills; Hechaman Homes of Napanee, Indians; and Darling Manufactured Homes of Novi.

The show attracts approximately 600,000 visitors.

This is the largest home show in the nation, according to officials. It boasts 400,000 square feet of exhibit space on two levels and houses nearly 400 exhibitors. Most are experts in some phase of residential building, heating and cooling, design, finance or prod-ucts used in the home.

AN AREA THE SIZE of six football fields has been set aside to accom-modate several blooming landscaped gardens complete with gazebos, water-falls, and thousands of shrubbery, flowers, trees, all of which have been forced to bloom or leaf just in time for

A huge flower floral spectacular, or ballroom-sized arrangement, will greet visitors near the main entry. Hun-dreds of flowers are flown in from around-the-world to complete the display, which this year will feature "Flowers as the Music of Love."

Additionally, 200 conventionally-sized floral arrangements will be displayed on individual pedestals by local Allied and FTD4 florists. They will compete for professional honors and a Parking for the **Builders Home Flower** and Furniture Show is really pretty simple and inexpensive. special "People's Choice" award, given to the florist who receives the most votes from visitors who purchase ballots' from the March of Dimes booth. The florists will also offer daily mini-

seminars on flower facts.

400 exhibitors at Builders Show

HE BUILDERS Home Flower and Furniture Show is the na-tion's largest home show offering the wares of more than 400 exhibitors.

"Our show is really a living show and our exhibitors feature anything and everything for the home," said Rosalle Lamb, show coordinator.

"For example, there's the invisible Fencing System of Birmingham, which specializes in "invisible" dog containment systems that keep a dog in the

ment systems that keep a dog in the yard without a fence," she said.

"The fencing system consists of a thin wire buried in the ground, a small radio transmitter, usually installed in a garage, a lightweight leather dog colfor with a transistorized radio receiver and a conditioning program for the

dog," she said.
Other unusual or trendy exhibitors in the show include the following:

• Pierson-Gribbs Homes Inc., which specializes in helping customers save money on building a home, by performing all the heavy exterior con-struction and supplying all the materi-als needed to finish the interiors by themselves.

Included in the construction cost are the inside materials, such as carpeting, paint, appliances, vinyl trim, electrical wiring and such. The customer can choose to subcontract the inside work, or "do! the pro-live." or 'do-it-themselves.'

 Mid-Michigan Waterworks Inc., which specializes in water treatment equipment, designed to filter contaminants, including iron, from drinking

water.

 Plymouth air-cooled equipment, from Plymouth, which distributes an extensive line of power products, and is the largest manufacturer of outdoor landscaping power equipment, such as riding lawn mowers.

Vinyl Sash of Pontiac, will exhibit its vinyl replacement windows and doors, storm windows and doors, patio doors, patio enclosures and roofing and

siding.
