

Florists to answer questions

Americans have been able to send flowers by wire for a long time — since 1910 when Florists' Transworld Delivery (FTD) was founded — but some people still have questions about the service.

A number of florists will be available to answer questions about the wire ser-vice as well as about flower selection and care during mini-seminars slated throughout the nine-day run of the 70th Builders Home Flower and Furniture Show, March 19-20, at Cobo Hall.

Show hours are Saturday and Sunday from 10 a.m. to 11 p.m. and weekdays 1-11 p.m. Admission is \$4 at the door for adults, \$1.50 for children 6-12 and senior citizens. Children under six are admitted free.

Florists don't netually ship flo-

Florists don't actually ship flowers and plants from one city to another. They send an "order," by telephone or computer, to a second florist in the distant city.

The florist who takes your flowers by wire order needs the complete address of the person who is going to receive the flowers or plants including.
