

'Good year for developers' — BASM head

Herbert Lawson, president of Her-bert Lawson Inc., Southfield, and president of the Builders Association of Southeastern Michigan (BASH) predicts 1988 will be an excellent year for residential developers.

Lawson predicts that 1988 will be "an excellent year with stendy growth for the industry. The indicators say the interest rates will level off, so we shouldn't see any of the ups and downs we've experienced in recent years," he said.

Lawson, an accountant, and his wife, Carol, a bookkeeper, whose father — Morris J. Dickstein — was a custom home builder, founded their firm some 20 years ago when they went looking for their first home.

"We were looking for a home in Southfield, and we found some houses that had been abandoned by a build-

er," said Lawson.
"So we went to Carol's brother,
Dennis Dickstein (BASH president in 1987) who was already involved in the residential home business and asked him to look at the houses.

"THE REST is history," he added. Mrs. Lawson serves the firm as the

executive vice president. Each applies their complementary skills to their building and development company.

Mrs. Lawson handles the market-ing, sales and designing; Lawson manages the business and financial aspects and they share the responsibilities of supervising construction at each development.

Lawson said lifestyles have changed the new demands in the market.


With both spouses working, condox are very attractive due to their carefree, low maintenance living style," he
