### Thriller 'Deathtrap' is a real arm-clencher

"Deathtrap" at Meadow Brook Theatre is a humdinger of a thriller. Warning — Don't wear rough-odged jewelry on your arm or hands if you go with anyone excitable be-cause the jewelry may become per-manently imbedded when that some-

one clutches in panic during the jui-ymurder seeme. S a murder, per-haps more than one, but I'd be on Ira Levin's hit list if I divulged who did. It, let alone the cleverly worked out scheme of who gets "done in" and why. Director David Regal handles the wissecracking humor with just the right touch, even though the best Jokes put down critles and their sur-lowage.

psychological surfaces and not qualify as profound theater, but it's a dandy thriller chockful of unexpected reversals and knowing references to classics like "Angel Street," "Dial "M' for Murder" and "Sleuti." Just a hint of the plot may be enough carrot to lure thriller bufs to see Meadow Brook's exemplary version of the play that ran on Broadway longer than any other thriller.

SIDNEY BRUHL, a playwright suffering from a seven-year dry spell with no hits, gets a brillant manuscript in the mail from a young writer named Ciliford Anderson. Anderson tells Bruhl he sent the manuscript hot off his typewriter before anyone else had read it or even knew

Sidney invites Clifford to come "talk" about the play, and he casuality remarks to his wife that he'd kill for a play as good as Clifford's. Surely he's kidding. The double-edged questions Sidney asks make his wife, Myra, worry, so she slays to chaperone the literary consultation between her husband and the fledging playwright with the sure-fire hit.

Bethany Carpenter plays a wife who supports her husband as a good wife should but trusts him only to a point. When called upon to shrick and carry on with breathless drama, she comes through splendidly.

James Anthony plays Sidney with a wilty, matter-of-fact case ideally suited to the role of a commercial man of words. His facile tongue and fertile mind hatch plots for thrillers on paper — or otherwise?

On the wall of his den, Sidney keeps a grisly collection of weapons conveniently ready for whatever the plot demands. His den, which doubles as the scene of the crime, is an elegantly renovated stable attached to the main house. Peter Hicks'

design for the der uses warm wood siding and a majnilicent fieldstone fireplace to create a comfortable rustic charm that contrasts sharply with the thoroughly peculiar events that happen when Elifford comes to visit.

inopportune moments. Jeanne Ar-nold as Helga stathers on the Dutch accent for comic effect and handies ESP humor with a sure touch, Sid-ney's sharp-but-duil lawyer, played with sauve professionalism by George Gitto, rounds out the fine Meadow Brook cast in the thriller of the season.

GEOFFREY BE UCHAMP plays an engaging Clifford with long, long legs and a boylsh stock of dark hair that he flips out of its eyes with every carriage return as he fervently types his manuscrip.
