Jon Vermeulen, charged with killing his second wife, is waiving his

ON DEC. 26, 1985, the prosecution ON DEC. 26, 1985, the prosecution says, Vermeulen shot and killed Ur-ime "Renae" Lewis, 24, his wife of six weeks who, he said, was five or six weeks pregnant. The couple had wed in Las Vegas although Vermeu-len's first marriage of 21 years wasn't ended until a February 1986 disease.

Larry Kaluzny of Birmingham,
Vermeulen's court-appointed attorney, filed a motion asking the marietal privilege with Sharon be waived as of Nov. 11, 1985, the date of the

Las vegas wedding.

In a recent interview in his jail cell, Vermeulen sald, "She (Sharon) says I told her I would kill Renae if she ever tried to leave me. What I said was I'd kill myself if Renae left me."

me."
Lewis had separated from Vermeulen one week before the shooting. Unaware her marriage to Vermeulen was illegal, she had intended to file for divorce on the day she

to file for divorce on one way and died.

Sharon's testimony is based on numerous conversations by telephone and in person with Vermeulen during the period he was separated from Lewis.

Vermeulen said he is worn emotionally thin by 27 months of waiting for trial. "I can't continue to live with this. It could take another year.

The question, Miller said, is not whether Vermeulen was legally married to Sharon at the time of the waste of the control of

John Lazar, arguing the defense case on appeal, said Sharon's testimony should be barred because "the law is very clear. You can't carve holes in it just to get testimony that is badlu wested."

Renae had moved into an area hotel a week earlier, but spent Christmas night with Vermeulen in their Mulrwood apartment in Farmlington Hills.

The following morning, while awas showering, Vermeulen said he retrieved a .44 magnum pistol from his automobile. It was a pistol issued to him in the 1960s when he served in the U.S. Army in Vietnam and carned the distinguished service cross, the bronze star and two purple hearts.

He returned to the apartment where he shot himself in the clest, barrely missing his heart.

Patterson appealed to the Supreme Court. "Appellate experts have told me they have absolutely no grasp on how long it might take for a (Su-preme Court) decision," Miller said. VEIMEULEN DOESN'T deny responsibility for Renae's death. He
said it was a horrible accident during a bungled suicide attempt.

Vermeulen is charged with one count of first-degree murder with a maximum penalty of life in prison. He's also charged with one count of possessing a firearm in the commission of a felony. Conviction carries a

maximum two-year prison term.

THE COUPLE had met the previous August on a business flight from Detroit to Dayton, Ohio.

Vermeulen said he fell deeply in

love the moment he met Lewis, a na-turalized U.S. citizen from Yugosia-

turalized U.S. citizen from Yugosiavia.
She introduced herself as Renae,
the name by which Vermeulen said
he always knew her. She was divorced alter a brief marriage.
"We knew we were going to be together. We had the right chemistry.
We were very compatible," Vermeulen said, describing Renae as 'brilliant, tenacloss, articulate and stylliant, tenacloss, articulate and stylwithin a mosth Vermeulen said.

Within a month Vermeulen said he filed for divorce from Sharon, whom he had married when he was 17 and

she 15.
In September, he moved into Renae's Farmington Hills apartment. Two months later, during a business trip to San Diego, they flew to Lax Vegas on impulse and were married Nov. 11. Upon their return to Mitchigan, they moved into the Muirwood apartment.

"Renae did not know I wasn't le-gally divorced. We had been living together, and the idea to get married came up out of the blue."

came up out of the blue."

Bur the Telationship was under stress. Vermeulen sald he was worfted about his job because the company was being sold to new owners. He was also concerned about a continuing relationship Renae had with an older man.

In addition, Vermeulen said Renae was upset over what he describes as a storny relationship with her parents, especially her father.

"She woke up crying nearly every night," worrying about two younger brothers and threatening to return to Yugoslavia, where she thought they might be with their mother, he said.

LT. BARRY Eriksen of the Oak-land County Sheriff's Department, day officer at the jail, said the length of time Vermeulen has spent in county jail waiting trial may have set a record. The prisoner spends 23 hours a day in a cell of 50 square feet. Ver-meulen calls it "a numbing hell."
