Libby Herros will display her geometric, non-objective acrylic paintings in a one-woman show in the Farmington Hills Branch Library through the month of April.

The one-woman show in the library for the month is the work of Margie Matovina.

Herros is a new member of the Farmington Artists Club. This is the first time her work is on exhibit as a member of the club, which showcases the art of its members in cooperation with the libraries.

She has studied with Ruth Jones for the past six years. In one of her recent exhibits, the Detroit Free Press Art Show, she won the purchase award and five merit awards.

Herros has shown her work in Michigan State Fair competition, the Scarab Club of Detroit and the Pontiac Creative Arts Center.

**MATOVINA'S STYLE** is realism. She works in oil, watercolor, colored pencil and tempera. The largest work of art she produced locally is the mural on a wall of the pediatric

Raised on a farm, Matovina loved horses and sketched them whenever possible. It wasn't until 1974 that she began art classes. She has studied with Sister Ignatius in Mercy Center, with David Messing, owner of Art and More, and with Jim Mumby,

who teaches Walled Lake Schools' adult education classes.

Since 1985 she has been chairman of the oil painting classes that are offered free to senior adults by the Farmington Artists Club in cooperation with the Farmington Hills Department of Special Services.
