Free camp caters to asthmatics

Asthmatic children do not have to spend their summer vacation indoors any longer.

The American Lung Association of Southeast Michigan (ALASEM) is accepting campership applications for its free, week-long summer camp, Camp Sun Deer.

Available to all Michigan children with severe asthma who are between ages 9 and 12, Camp Sun Deer camperships are not awarded on the basis of financial need, but rather on

medical history (chosen campers are limited due to their asthmatic condition).

For information about applying for a free campership, call ALASEM at 559-5100 weekdays. Applications must be completed by parents (or legal guardians) and physicians and returned by Monday, May 16.

Camp Sun Deer will be held Sunday, June 26, through Saturday, July 2, at the Battle Creek Outdoor Education Center (Clear Lake Camp), Dowling, Mich.

Children chosen to attend this camp will be treated to the same experiences as youngsters who attend traditional camps.

With the support of trained medical professionals who closely monitor both the health of each camper and the variety of activities offered, campers will be able to broaden their experiences and enjoy a summer full of activities and adventures. Activities like swimming, archery, fishing and hiking await the Camp Sun Deer camper.
