The Falcons scored 93 goals, nearly doubling their total of the previous year.

Bartram, who remains undecided about certain positions, is thinking of moving Martin to haltback as a replacement for her sister, all-stater Leslie, who graduated last spring.

"We've got a lot of talent up front, and there's going to be some adjustments made as far as moving players around, depending on what's going on in the game," Bartram sald.

JUNION JENNIFER Missros, a co-captain, is Farmington's top returned at halback. She missed much of the season with a broken ankle, but returned in time to score nine goals and distribute 14 assists.
