


"Chances are slim to none because the feeling in Lansing is that future requests for statewide gas tax would no longer be supported, and that would hit northern Michigan hard," he said.

THE ROAD commission has met with 46 of 58 Oakland County communities in a repeat elfort of a series of meetings held two years ago to keep abreast of current projects and mutual airing of concerns. Bair expects to complete the current round by the end of April.

"Some councils are already sup-porting (the proposal) with resolu-tions. We're going to have to tell citi-zens what they'll get for these new revenues. Our plan will be sensitive to community needs," he said. If the fee is approved by voters,


the road commission would receive half the revenue, about \$10.8 million annually, with the other half divided annually, with the other half divided among cities and villages, based on population and road mileage.
