

Churchill takes title from Rocks

When it comes to shootouts, Livonia Churchill soccer coach Nick O'Shea doesn't follow any elaborate guidelines.

Actually, he employs no strategy at all.

"I just say 'OK, who's going to score the first one?'" said O'Shea. "And whoever says 'me,' goes up there and shoots first, and right on down the line."

Leri Place must not have been too eager to shoot, but it was a goal from Place — the last of five Churchill players in the shoot-out — that decided Friday's game at Plymouth Salem. Churchill outscored Salem 4-3 during the shootout, earning the Western Lakes Athletic Association title in a game that was tied 1-1 after regulation, two overtime periods and two sudden deaths.

Naturally, all parties on Churchill's side were relieved afterward, including Place, who is only a freshman.

Place's shot never left the ground, but snuck into the net under the outstretched arms of Ellen Schnackel.

"I JUST TRIED to put it in the corner," Place said. "I hit it good and she got a piece of it, but it went in and that's all that counts."

"It feels awesome to win. The state (title) is what I want to win."

Churchill earned the right to play for the title by winning the Western Division at 4-1, while Salem won the Lakes crown at 3-0-1. The Chargers

are 8-3 overall, and Salem slipped to 6-2-4.

Salem had a 3-2 advantage early in the shootout, getting goals from its first three shooters. But the Rocks' best offensive threat, Jai Eusey hit the post on the next opportunity. Churchill goalie Monya Cervi then stopped a shot by Salem's fifth shooter, Tracey Krajewski, leaving it up to Place.

"I didn't think they'd make five-of-five," said O'Shea. "But surprisingly she (Eusey) missed. Maybe she felt more pressure with the younger players making it before her."

"It's all a matter of confidence. If you're confident, chances are you'll make it."

THE GAME lasted nearly 244 hours, but few fans left, even though the temperature must have dipped 20 degrees by the end.

Churchill had at least three chances to score in the extra sessions. Churchill's Shannon Stachurski was fouled by Schnackel in the second sudden-death overtime. Also, a goal scored by Churchill in the second overtime was disallowed because of goalie interference, and before that, Schnackel made a fine save on a shot by Churchill's Nikki Johnson.

The two teams exchanged momentum throughout the game.

"Really there never was a turning

point in the game, because it never turned," O'Shea said. "It was a funny game. It was their game for 10 minutes, then our game for 10 minutes and theirs for five and ours for five."

"Give credit to (Rosemary) Hally on defense and Kellie Davis is very good back there. Every time anyone got through, she was there to intercept the ball."

CHURCHILL NEVER trailed in regulation, and scored at 8:39 of the first half on a shot from Davis off a corner kick by Stachurski. Missy

Smith scored Salem's goal at 19:11.

"It could have gone either way," said Salem coach Ken Johnson. "We had the action for 10 or 15 minutes and then they would. We hit the post (in the shoot-out), but it was six inches from being in. She tried to place it, and it's one of those things."

"But that's soccer. I like shoot-outs. It gives the girls good experience."

Scoring goals in the shoot-out for Salem were Smith, Sara Hayes and Amy Krajewski. Dawn Gabriel, Hally, Davis and Place scored for Churchill.
