FRAUD CONVICTION
A Farmington Hills man who is one of three men convicted of 10 counts of mail fraud in connection with a Detroit real estate scheme said through his attorney that he will appeal the verdict.
A. U.S. District Court jury in Detroit handed down a guitly verdict Wednesday after a 3th-week trial before Chief Judge Phillip Prait.
The defendants were Richard S. Hartman, 63, of Farmington Hills, John Silcker, 44, of Keego Harbor and Stanishaus Gradski, 34, of Livonia.
The three were indicted last September based on an investigation by the Michigan State Police and the U.S. Postati Service, said Bloodell Morey, U.S. assistant atterney who tried the case.
The indictment charged that the defendants bought U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development houses at \$4,000-81,000, modestly improved them, then sold them for four to five times that amount between 1882 and 1984. The defendants alded the buyers in falsifying their credit worthiness. Morey said.
When the buyers defaulted on movergap payments and the houses. "By then, they were abanded and worth about as much as the defendants paid for them." Morey said.
"We, of course, are disappointed by the verdict," said Hartman's defense attorney, David Steingold of Detroit.

Hartman has maintained his innocence throughout the case, said Steingold, who began representing Hartman abon't weeks feet the trial.

"I believe the result very well could have been different if we had earlier been provided material not disclosed until the trial — for which the judge admonished the presecution." Steingold said.

Steingold will pedition Pratt for a new trial on grounds that the court refused to grant a separate trial for each defendant and that the government withheld important discovery material that should have been provided well before trial.

He would not comment on specific facts of the case while sentencing is pending.

The defendants remain free on personal bond. They face a penalty of up to five years in prison and a \$5,000 fine per count.
