BECOMING IMMUNE TO ARTHRITIS MEDICATION
Even if aspirin or a similar drug is controlling your arthritis, you may be tempted to stop it because you heard that you could become "immune" to the medication. By stopping the drug you hope to avoid that problem, and have the medicine ready to work for you at a future time when you are in need. Bacteria can develop drug resistance to an antibiotic if you take it for a prolonged period. However, aspirin and similar drugs are not antibiotics and do not lend themselves to drug resistance by the agent responsible for the arthritis. When you have a flare, your physician is likely to increase the amount of the medication you are taking rather than dropping it for another one. Experience shows that acute episodes of arthritis are best controlled by increasing medicine that has helped in the past, and adding rest, heat, and intermittent injection. This combination of therapy would not enjoy success if the body developed a resistance to the medicine. Arthritis medication works best when taken every day. Stopping medication or taking it intermittently permits inflammation to thrive, and gives you the erroneous impression that the arthritis has become "immune" to the therapy.

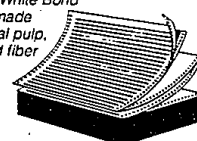

EXTRA HEART BEATS
Except for some change with breathing, most of the time our heart is quite regular and does not have a need for it. When a heart beat comes earlier than should, the following beat may come late, giving the chance for the heart to be completely filled by blood and beat forcefully. This causes a bad feeling in many people. The early beats are called "Premature Heart Beats." These beats may come from different parts of the heart. We are more concerned about ventricular ectopic beats, which are seen in many normal people, but are more common in patients with heart problems, especially after a heart attack. In general we doctors do not like our patients to have extra heart beats. However, we do not treat every one with extra heart beats, because many of them are benign and it does not cause danger. On the other hand, we will try our best to control some other ones. The basic rule is to see if a patient has an underlying heart problem, a heart attack, myocardial ischemia, cardiac failure, cardiomyopathy, etc. If the heart itself is normal, then we may not treat the patient. This is the key issue. That is why we recommend a person with extra heart beats to have a thorough cardiac examination, because it is a must!
