## CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING

Mayor Sorensen opened the regular meeting of the Farmington Hills City Council on May 23, 1988 at 7:30 p.m. Members present: Mayor Sorensen, Mayor Pro-Tem Sever, Alkateeb, Dolan, Fox, Marks, and Vagnozzi. Others present: City Manager Couck, City Clerk Reynolds, Assistant City Manager Call, Director of Special Services Blawie, and City Attorney Blawie.

Council approved the agenda, as published.  
Council approved the minutes of May 9, 1988, as published.

Council enacted Ordinance No. C-17-88, Zoning Request No. 4-2-88, in the NE 1/4 of Section 18, 27885 Haled, west side of Haled between Twelve Mile Road and Enterprise Court, to rezone from RA-1 to OS-4.

Council enacted Ordinance No. C-18-88, Zoning Request No. 5-2-88, in the W 1/4 of Section 8, 30708 Hagedy Road, east side of Hagedy between Thirteen and Fourteen Mile Roads, to rezone from RP-2 to RC-2.

Council enacted Ordinance No. C-19-88, Zoning Request No. PCZR 6-3-88, in the SW 1/4 of Section 8, 37585 Twelve Mile Road, northeast corner of Twelve Mile and Haled Roads, to rezone from B-1 to OS-1.

Council proposed Charter Amendment to amend Section 3.02.C. on the August primary.

Council introduced Ordinance amending the Uniform Traffic Code to provide for proposed revision of the City Traffic Code relative to the regulation of school buses and traffic in the vicinity of school buses loading and unloading.

Council introduced Ordinance to add a Historical Site to Chapter 3, Article IV, of the City Code (Historical Site No. 18, Mark Arnold Home, 28499 Drake Road).

Council introduced Ordinance amending Chapter 28, Article II, House Moving, of the City Code.

Council authorized City Manager to enter into the Traffic Enforcement Agreement with Rumblewood Association to provide traffic enforcement, following adoption of appropriate traffic control orders by the City.

Council approved permanent connection into sanitary sewage system of Farmington Hills for Newberry Plaza Shopping Center.

Council authorized City to enter into agreement with Oakland County Road Commission for design and right-of-way acquisition for Orchard Lake Road from Eleven Mile to Grand River Avenue.

Council agreed to send a request to Oakland County Road Commission requesting installation of traffic signal at one-half mile point between Twelve and Thirteen Mile on Orchard Lake Road.

Council adopted the following Traffic Control Order Nos.:

PRSL-118-1988 establishing a 25 mph speed limit on all roadways within Rumblewood Subdivision.

PRSL-119-1988 establishing a 30 mph speed limit for north and south-bound Tanglewood Drive between 13 and 14 Mile Roads; requiring all traffic to stop before entering Tanglewood Drive and;

PRP-3-1988 prohibiting on-street parking between the hours of 3:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. on Tanglewood Drive, Brookwood Drive, Fox Glen, Fox Chase, Fox Run, Valley Ridge Drive, Applewood Lane, Turtle Creek, Greenwisp, Deer Run, Briarwood Court, and Cottonwood Court.

Council authorized City Manager to issue a purchase order to Signal Systems of Farmington for installation of electrical service to Carl Corral/Youth Sports Storage at San Marino Golf Course in the amount of \$7,100.00.

Council adopted resolution of Notice of Intent to raise taxes and publish Proposed Notice of Public Hearing scheduled for June 6, 1988 on levying additional taxes on the proposed fiscal 1988-89 City Budget.

Council agreed to Public Hearing on proposed Budget for Fiscal 1988-89 for Monday, June 6, 1988, at 7:30 p.m. in City Council Chambers.

Council awarded contract in the amount of \$147,824.00 for Truck Road Storm Sewer and Pavement project, from Grand River Avenue to Nine Mile Road, to South Hill Construction Co., Inc. S.A.D. C-212.

Council agreed to petition Oakland County Road Commission to accept jurisdiction of Fourteen Mile Road from the easterly City limit to the westerly City limit and to petition the Oakland County Road Commission to relinquish jurisdiction of Farmington Road from Fourteen Mile to Ten Mile Road to the City.

Council awarded Fire Station No. 3, Wheeler Street, parking lot/site improvements project to South Hill Construction Co. in the amount of \$26,747.00.

Council authorized issuance of traffic control orders, as outlined in CMR 5-6-11, except to establish a reduction the speed limit on Drake Road, between Twelve and Thirteen Mile Roads, from 40 to 35 mph.

Council adopted Resolution No. 4, setting the date of June 26, 1988 for Cost Hearing for Edythe Drive Road Rehabilitation Special Assessment District.

Council approved request from Farmington Founders Festival Committee and agreed to issue a Parade Permit and authorized closing of Grand River Avenue from Grand River Drive to Theater west to Farmington Road for Saturday, July 14, 1988 from 10:00 a.m. through 12:00 noon.

Council approved employment of Brian James Schlerob as Seasonal Maintenance Laborer, per Article X, Section 10.01.A., of the City Code.

Meeting adjourned at 11:35 p.m.

# Cable growth brings system changes

There have been cable outages and MetroVision supervisor, Marvin Nelson, is not looking for excuses.

Our franchise area has never stopped growing. In 1988-89, there will be 3,000 more household units with the ability to receive cable. This past winter found MetroVision preparing for the increased growth by developing an optimum design for our cable system.

"Designing the system is like building your home and determining how many appliances will use the circuit breaker. Wiring the home for this anticipated use and then having the circuit breaker blow out over and over. What do you do? You add another circuit breaker to meet the realistic needs," Nelson said.

The secondary cause of outages is that Detroit Edison is building a new "primary electrical field" from Northville into the 10 Mile and Hagedy area.

Even though there is power surge protection, when switching from the old supply to the new, some power surges are affecting our cable system.

Our area is unique as there are heavy demands on all power supplies: new subdivisions are everywhere. Construction, both digging underground and cranes aerially, potentially can and does disrupt the cable plant.

Nelson and staff are trying to stay a jump ahead by maintaining the

system and looking for things that could potentially lead to problems.

Your calls do help them be more thorough. However, if there is an outage and you can't get through, call our office at the Cable Commission and we will be happy to relay your message, 473-7266.
