## Officer: Teach every student water safety

T'IS NOT the money Bob Smith is interested in. It's the water safely the money could buy.

"Is interested in. It's the water safely the money could buy.

It is not seen so that is the water safely the more without instruction," said Sgt. Smith, a Troy resident and head of the Oakland County Sherilf's Department marine safely division. His motto: "Have materials, will travel." Smith would like to teach marine safety to every high school student in Oakland County, just the way driving a car on a road is taught.

"We live in a state full of lakes and water," he said, noting that Oak-land has 450 lakes and Michigan, the Great Lake State, officially has 11,037.

THE FACT that a school district in the southern part of the county has no lakes, and the principal doesn't see the need for water safety instruction, is irrelevant, Smith said. He points out that a teenager who drowned in a Gilbert Lake boating mishap last month was from landlocked Oak Park.

It's part of a package of four marine safety bills on which state Sen. Richard Fessler, R.-Commerce, plans to hold hearings soon in his committee on State Affairs, Tourism and Transportation.

Smith's eye is on SB 4, which would slap a \$10 judgment fee on top

of any fine that a judge levies against a boater for violating the Marine Safety Act. Fines collected in Oakland County would be carmarked for the county's marine safety programould be used for law and the county of the county

state, Smith said.

WHENEVER SGT. Smith can get a group of 20 to 30, he'll put on the six-hour marine safety course. Groups can call him at 858-4991 in Pontiac.

With more money, he could assign one full-time officer to teach marine antey in all 28 school districts within the county.

Another legislative measure would require that all driver education courses also include at least six hours of instruction in the safe operation of recreational vehicles and watercraft.

It would parallel the driver training programs received by 100,000 high school sophomores every year.

FESSLER IS pushing a measure to license motorboat mechanics, much the same as motor vehicle mechanics are licensed. Consumer rights are spelled out in the bill. If passed, the act would be administered by the secretary of state.

"There are a lot of ripoffs," Fessier sald.

## Boat safety bills in Senate panel

Here are the four oills in the loads safety package now being considered by the Michigan Senate Committee on State Affairs, Tourism and Transportation:

• SB 4 – Requires a \$10 "judgement fee" on top of other fines for violations of the Marine Safety Act. Fees would be earmarked for the marine safety accurate in the constitution.

• SB 5 — Would require the cer-tification of motorboat mechanics under the Motorboat Service and Re-pair Act. Mechanics would be tested and certified. Consumers' rights would be spelled out — such as a written estimate and itemized state-

SB 371 — Sets up a Marine
Safety Coupcil under the Department of Natural Resources to review boating accidents and develop a comprehensive boating afecty program. An 11-member council would include men and women from law enforcement, Red Cross, industry and consumers council.
