BIG TEN'S BEST

University of Michigan was busy playing in the NCAA baseball Central Region tournament last week-end at the University of Texas when Big Ten honors were announced. And, among those chosen for first-team All-Big Ten accolades was U-M pitcher Mike Ignasiak, a senior from Orchard Lake St. Mary's.

Ignasiak finished with a 9-5 overall record in 16 games, with a 3.14 earned run average. Ignasiak, a right-hander, pitched 80 1/3 innings and surrendered 63 hits and 48 walks while striking out 77. He also had one save.

The Wolverines entered the NCAA tournament with a 46-17 record. They were seeded fourth in the six-team Central Region.

NETTING SUCCESS

The NCAA's team tournament could have been kinder to Ed Nagel, a senior from West Bloomfield at University of Michigan. Nagel and No. 1 doubles partner Malavai Washington were ranked as one of the best in the nation, but they had trouble in the tournament, winning just one of three matches.

They defeated Craig Johnson and Grant Saacks of Pepperdine 6-2, 6-3 in U-M's second match, a 5-3 upset victory in the quarterfinals. Nagel and Washington lost 6-0, 6-2 to Georgia Tech's Kenny Thorne and Jens Skjeld, and were beaten 6-3, 6-4 by Louisiana State's Jeff Brown and Felix Barrientos.

U-M beat Georgia Tech 5-4 in the NCAA's first round and Pepperdine in the quarterfinals, but lost 5-4 to LSU in the semifinals. Nagel, playing No. 2 singles, won two of three matches. He defeated Tech's Bryan Shelton 6-7, 7-5, 7-5, and Pepperdine's Andrew Smolger 6-3, 7-5, but lost to LSU's Billy Uribe 6-4, 7-5.

Nagel was in Athens, Ga., last week to compete in the NCAA's individual men's tennis tournament. He won his first match, 7-5, 7-8 over Paul Haahrhus of Florida State Wednesday.

TOP TIGER

Brad Player, a sophomore at DePaul University from Birmingham (Seaholm), was selected as the Tigers' most valuable tennis performer after posting a 15-7 record at No. 1 singles. Pierce also teamed

with Jack Keenan for a 17-6 mark at No. 1 doubles.

Pierce qualified and played in the NCAA's Division III tournament in Washington last 6-0, 6-2 to Georgia Tech's Kenny Thorne and Jens Skjeld, and was beaten 6-3, 6-4 by Louisiana State's Jeff Brown and Felix Barrientos.

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NOTABLES

Shawn Harg, a sophomore outfielder at Central Michigan from Rochester, earned honorable mention All-Mid-American Conference accolades. Harg batted .359 for the MAC champion Chippewas, 11th best in the league, with six doubles, two triples, six homers, 35 runs batted in, 48 runs scored and 17 stolen bases.

Dave Hull, a sophomore at Hope College from Rochester, led the Flying Dutchmen golfers to their second-straight 17th-place finish at the NCAA Division III championships May 20 in Greensboro, N.C. Hull averaged 79.7 strokes over three 18-hole rounds. Hope totaled 956; California State-Stanislaus won its fifth straight title with a 921.

Jason Smith, a junior right-handed pitcher at Northwood Institute from Birmingham, had the third-best winning percentage in school history (.714) by posting a 5-2 record. He had a 5.36 earned run average, striking out 37 batters in 45 1/3 innings while walking 22. His best game was a one-hit shutout of Urbana, N.I. finished 22-25.

3. Oakland Community College's women's basketball team enjoyed its most successful season ever with a 24-4 record, and co-captain Michelle Taubee accounted for by excelling in the classroom as well, earning academic All-NCAA honors. Taubee, a 5-foot-10 sophomore forward, had a 3.9 grade point average.

She will graduate next month summa cum laude, with a degree in industrial fine arts. Taubee plans to attend either Furman University or Bowling Green State and play volleyball or basketball.
