

Accident victim a good neighbor

An elderly Farmington Hills woman who died three hours after she was accidentally run over in a nearby driveway was characterized as "a good neighbor."

Sylvia Pearl Perry, 84, died at 6:15 p.m. Monday in Botsford General Hospital, Farmington Hills, from injuries sustained in the accident, which occurred at 2:45 p.m. on Sunday, near Eight Mile and Orchard Lake roads.

"She often would bring extra food to neighbors," said Kim Gouine, a neighbor for four years. "Even if you told her you didn't need it, she'd leave it anyway."

Gouine said she and her husband often lent Perry a hand — cutting the grass, doing home repairs, watching her dogs.

PERRY WAS walking to a neighbor's house to deliver fruit juice when she was accidentally struck by a four-wheel-drive truck being backed into the street.

The driver told officers he took his rear-view mirror, saw nothing unusual and continued to back up, unaware Perry was crouching to

pick up juice cans she had dropped, said officer Don Fradette of the Farmington Hills Police Department Traffic Section.

Perry was struck by a bumper and run over by a wheel, but was alert and speaking at the scene, Fradette said. She died later of multiple injuries, according to the Oakland County Medical Examiner.

"There were a lot of unfavorable factors," Fradette said. "The driver was seated higher in a four-wheel-drive truck, the woman was only 5 feet tall and she was crouching."

No charges are pending, Fradette said.

A **HOMEMAKER**, Perry is survived by a sister, Lila Carlson, and a brother, James Reynolds.

Services will be held at 2 p.m. today at Rose B. Northrop & Son Funeral Home, 22401 Grand River, Detroit. The Rev. Kenneth Kohlmann of Redford United Methodist Church in Detroit will officiate. Visitation will be from noon to 2 p.m. Burial will be in Grand Lawn Cemetery, Detroit.

police/fire calls

Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls and court cases reported during the past week:

● FELONY CHARGED

A 27-year-old Detroit man faces a felony charge in connection with the theft of a bread truck from a Farmington Hills gas station May 30.

Arraigned Monday before Magistrate Dennis Phieney of Farmington, the man stood mute to one count of receiving and concealing stolen property over \$100. An innocent plea was entered.

Bond was set at \$5,000 pending a preliminary examination in 4th District Court. Conviction could bring a penalty of up to five years in prison and a \$2,500 fine.

The charge stems from the theft of a bread truck parked at the Shell station, 12 Mile and Halsted, about midnight May 30, said officer Jerry McKenzie of the Farmington Hills Police Department.

● WOMAN ROBBED

A 27-year-old Detroit woman was robbed of her purse, a pair of gym shoes and a neck chain at 1:50 p.m. May 29 while she was walking on St. Francis, near Eight Mile, May 29.

Her assailant was described as a man in his 30s, according to a Farmington Hills police report.

● STATUE FOUND

A six-foot-tall statue of Ronald McDonald was found near the tennis courts at North Farmington High School, 32900 13 Mile, following a report of a disorderly group gathering at 12:20 a.m. May 31.

On arrival, the group was gone but officer Gary Bradley found the statue in the ground. An attempt was made to cement it in, according to a Farmington Hills police report.

● HOUSE FIRE

An accidental fire caused about \$575 in damage to a house on Barwell at 2:30 a.m. May 31.

The homeowner extinguished the fire with a garden hose.

Investigators believe a discarded cigarette may have ignited a log next to the house, causing the overhanging aluminum siding to blacken, said Deputy Chief Peter Baldwin of the Farmington Hills Fire Department.

● WOMEN HURT

Two Farmington women received multiple injuries in a two-car collision at Silvassee and Lilac in Farmington on Memorial Day.

Warrants are being sought against the driver of the second car, a 37-year-old Taylor man, charging him with operating his vehicle under the influence, according to a Farmington

Department of Public Safety report.

The 18-year-old driver of the first car and her 19-year-old passenger were hurt when the driver of a car on Lilac did not yield and struck their car, which was eastbound on Silvassee, broadly.

The women were taken to Botsford General Hospital, Farmington Hills. The driver sustained a broken pelvis and possible cracked ribs; her passenger received multiple facial cuts and a leg injury.

Police open house to stress many themes

Entertainment and education will

go hand in hand at the Farmington Hills Police Department's first open house Sunday, June 5.

Scheduled from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.,

the open house will highlight themes of drug awareness, crime prevention and Neighborhood Watch.

The open house is designed to acquaint residents with the police department, its role in the community and the new year-old police building on 11 Mile, west of Orchard Lake Road, adjacent to Farmington Hills city hall.

In addition to providing literature at various displays throughout the building, the open house promises to provide residents with entertainment, ranging from the musical to well-known crime prevention personalities and a competition of muscled and strategy between the police and fire departments.

Some of the programs offered will run throughout the daylong open house. Others will be offered at specific times.

THROUGHOUT THE day, self-guided tours of the new police building will be available. A weaponry display will be in the indoor firing range and the coil blocks and communications center will be open for viewing.

In the Sally port, evidence technicians will be demonstrating their skills, according to open house coordinator Sgt. Dennis Green.

Television will be in four locations showing videos of the average police roll call, drug awareness, the E-911 emergency telephone system and a welcome address by Farmington Hills police Chief William Dwyer.

At 11 a.m. the Oakland County Mounted Division will arrive and remain until 3 p.m. A formal program is not planned, Green said.

The Detroit Police Blue Pigs band will play at 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m.

AT 1 P.M., McGruff the crime prevention dog and Sparky the fire safety dog are expected to arrive by

Detroit Police helicopter to join the festivities. The helicopter will remain for public viewing.

From 2-2:30 p.m. the fire and police departments will have a tug of war competition. Two out of three successful pulls will determine the winner. The winning team will be awarded a plaque with plenty of room for additional names for planned future tugs.

Police and fire officials plan to make the tug of war competition a twice-a-year battle. The two departments will meet the challenge again in October during National Fire Prevention Week.

At 3 p.m., Ronald McDonald will make his entrance.

The police and fire departments, as well as CEAS, will have their emergency vehicles on hand all day for public viewing. Demonstrations by the fire and police departments also are expected.

Refreshments will be provided by the Farmington/Farmington Hills Optimists Club and the Farmington Rotary Club.
