Exclusivity ruling may expand cable's commitment to quality

The Federal Communications Commission has reinstated a rule titled "Syndicated Exclusivity." The rule will take effect in one year. Syndicated Exclusivity means that an author of a television program may enter into a contract with broadcast, cabe or superstation and may sell the rights in an exclusive or mon-exclusive manner. This rule opens a wider market for competition. It also creates a tremendous burden on the cable industry. Fortunately the industry has one year to prepare a realistic program packaging. The burden for the cable industry is that it is required to block out any duplicate programming, with the season stations, WGN and WGR, have been notorious for duplicate programming. Frankly. I believe that the ulti-

WOR, have been notorious for dupli-cate programming.
Frankly, I believe that the ulti-mate result will be much geater quality programming for the con-sumer as some of the independent producers whose programs may be a bit avant garde may now have a chance at bloding in the open mar-ketplace. Also, the stations that have capitalized upon duplicate program-ming may look around for quality offerings.
The down alternative is that the

The down alternative is that the cable system may have to decide to quit offering a station if the program selections require them to have to black out an ourcasonable amount of shows. They have their customers to serve and certainly will base their decisions upon what will provide the most quality and diverse options for their public.
