With one exception, that is: Hurley Haywood, driving a Group 14 Audi Quattro (headquarters in Troy). By his own admission, Haywood struggled throughout the race, lacking the speed to keep up with many of his competitors.

But what Haywood's Audi lacked in speed, it made up for in endurance and consistency. And that combined with a lot of luck — put Haywood into the winner's circle. "I just couldn't keep pace with Scott (Pruett) and Willy (T. Ribbs)," said Haywood after collecting his second victory of the Trans Am sesson. 


