

# No '89 pay raise for Congress, brass

Here's how area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes June 16-17.

## HOUSE

**PAY RAISE** — The House adopted, 230 for and 170 against, an amendment preventing members of Congress and other top U.S. officials from receiving a 4-percent cost-of-living raise next January.

The amendment blocks the raise for officials earning at least \$72,500 while permitting it for all other civilian and military workers. It was attached to a fiscal 1989 Treasury-Postal appropriations bill (HR 4775) that was later sent to the Senate.

The most recent raises for House members and senators have been a 3-percent cost-of-living hike in January 1987, boosting their pay to \$77,400, and a \$12,100 hike in February 1987 that raised members' salaries to the current \$89,500 level.

## Roll Call Report

R-III, termed it "inappropriate" for members to raise their pay for the third time since January 1987.

Opponent Steny Hoyer, D-Md., said "members of Congress ought to be kept current with inflation."

Members voting yes wanted to deny a proposed 4-percent pay raise for lawmakers and other high federal officials. Voting yes: Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth; Dennis Hertel, D-Harper Woods; and William Broomfield, R-Birmingham.

Voting no: William Ford, D-Taylor; and Sander Levin, D-Southfield.

**RANDOM DRUG TESTING** — By a vote of 377 for and 27 against, the House endorsed random federal testing of airline pilots, train operators, truckers and other key transporta-

tion employees for drug and alcohol abuse.

The vote instructed House conferees on an airline service bill (HR 3051) to accept Senate-approved language requiring the Department of Transportation to begin the random testing.

The House has resisted random testing of transportation workers, amid objections from civil libertarians and transportation unions.

Members voting yes endorsed random drug and alcohol testing of key transportation employees. Voting yes: Pursell, Hertel, Levin and Broomfield.

Voting no: Ford.

**U.N. FUNDING** — By a vote of 180 for and 222 against, the House refused to lower the United States' contribution to the United Nations budget from some \$480 million to \$424.5 million.

Sponsor Pat Swindall, R-Ga., condemned U.N. agencies that "bash the United States of America."

Opponent Bill Frenzel, R-Minn., said Swindall's approach would "destroy a number of international organizations which . . . U.S. commercial and economic interests find to be terribly in our advantage."

Members voting yes favored cutting American support of the U.N.

Voting no: Pursell, Hertel, Ford, Levin and Broomfield.

## SENATE

**DEATH PENALTY** — By a vote of 65 for and 29 against, the Senate

passed and sent to the House a bill (S 2455) permitting federal courts to order the execution of people convicted of drug-related killings.

Sponsor Alfonse D'Amato, R-N.Y., said: "It's about time we said to the Darth Vaders of the drug world that you will face the ultimate sanction . . ."

Opponent Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., called the death penalty "cruel and unusual punishment."

Senators voting yes favored the federal death penalty for drug-related killings. Voting yes: Donald Riegle, D-Mich.

Voting no: Carl Levin, D-Mich.

**LEGISLATIVE BUDGET** — By a vote of 78 for and 18 against, the Senate passed and sent to conference

with the House a legislative branch budget of \$1.77 billion for fiscal 1988, an increase of more than 1 percent over the comparable 1988 appropriation.

Senators voting yes favored the legislative branch appropriations bill. Voting yes: Michigan's Levin and Riegle.

**WELFARE REFORM** — By a vote of 41 for and 54 against, the Senate refused to exclude "workfare" from pending welfare reform legislation (HR 1720).

Senators voting yes were opposed to adding limited "workfare" to the welfare reform bill. Voting yes: Riegle. Levin did not vote.

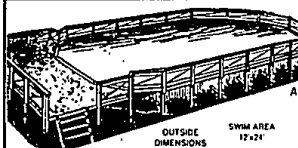
