on a regular basis. John Dolan would begin a regular direct mail program and establish a centrally located office in the district with regular office hours.

Bouchard would continue Brotherton's communications, such as newsletters and personal involvement in the district. "Being accessible to my constituency is paramount," he said.

Jan Dolan would be in touch both face-to-face and by phone, she said. She would also publish a monthly newsletter to keep constituents current on Lansing issues.

Sarafa has promised to commute daily from Lansing and make himself available at all times. He plans to open a district office, at his own expense, with regular office hours. "I will be the most visible and accessible representative Michigan has ever had," he said.

Welday said he will "actively seek input" by maintaining a district office with weekly hours. He also proposes town meetings for important legislation discussions and sending newsletters.

Driver retraining aimed at elderly

The Oakland County Senior Citizens Driving Retraining Program, an innovative project designed to help older people improve their driving skills and maintain highway mobility will be offered at Farmington Hills City Hall July 18-19.

The hall is at 31555 11 Mile. Program hours will be 1-5 p.m.

The program is hosted by the Farmington Hills Senior Adult Division and sponsored by the Traffic Improvement Association of Oakland County under a federal grant received through the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning.

The classroom portion of the program, 55 ALIVE/MATURE DRIVING, was developed by the American Association of Retired Persons and is the first comprehensive driver retraining course geared to the specific needs of older motorists.

The course covers the effects of aging and medications on driving, basic driving rules, traffic hazards, adverse road conditions, energy saving and accident prevention measures. In addition to the classroom work, seniors will have the opportunity to register for psycho-physical testing and driver performance evaluation. The psycho-physical testing measures such factors as brake reaction time, glare recovery for night driving, visual acuity, and other elements important to driving.

The evaluation portions of the training will be used solely for the purpose of counseling senior drivers. The results of the performance measurement will be known only to the driver and the evaluator.

The Oakland County Senior Citizens Driving Retraining Program is unique in the United States in that no other known training for senior citizens includes psycho-physical and on-the-road performance evaluations.

RESEARCH SHOWS that older drivers are involved in more accidents than their middle-aged counterparts when the record is based on actual miles driven. The physical changes of aging create difficulties for many older drivers when yielding the right-of-way, backing, turning, changing lanes, and entering and leaving expressways.

However, research also indicates that older people can improve their driving abilities through additional training, attention and practice, enabling them to maintain their driving licenses longer while driving more safely.

People 55 years of age or older are eligible to participate. The course fee is \$7. There is no additional charge for the evaluations.
