Runners benefit Common Ground

The 6th annual Back to Birmingham Run to benefit Common Ground begins at 9 a.m. Sunday, July 24. The race will include a 10K run, a 2 mile run and a 2 mile fitness walk. This year, 1,500 runners are expected to participate in the course that begins at Seaborn High School, Lincoln and Cranbrook and continues throughout Birmingham and Beverly Hills.

The non-refundable entry fee is \$7. If a runner is not registered by July 15, the late fee is \$10. Registration will continue until 8:45 a.m. the morning of the race. The first 750 entrants will receive a T-shirt and all participants will receive a certificate.

The awards ceremony will immediately follow the run. All trophies, medals, ribbons and certificates will be passed out at that time. The male

and female winner of the 10K run will be awarded a \$100 bond. The male and female winners of the 2K run and the second place male and female in the 10K run will receive a \$75 bond; and a \$50 bond will go to the third male and female in the 10K. The bonds were donated by First of America Bank in Birmingham.

The first three runners of the walk, both over 50 years of age and under 50 years of age, will win trophies. A drawing for free shoes from Sherman Shoes in Birmingham will be held.

This year, a corporate team category has been added to the race sponsored by Elkin Equities. Corporate teams may consist of any number of participants, but only the three runners with the best times are

scored. The top five corporate teams will win trophies and a special trophy will be given to the corporate team with the most participants.

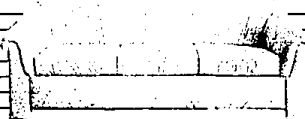
