A dream matchup for Saturday's 40th running of the \$300,000 Mich gain Mile at Ladbroke DRC apparently has fallen through.

A duel between Lost Code, considered one of the country's hottest thoroughbreds, and Cutlass Reality, one of the west coast's top horses, will not come off.

In last week's National Thoroughbred poll, conducted by 45 media representatives from across the country, Lost Code was rated No. 2, while Cuttass Reality was ranked No. 8.
