Q. Our real estate brozer has told us that she can assist us in regard to the purchase of our unit and we don't need a lawyer because they generally loud things up. She says the sellers are very sensitive and will not negotiate on any of the terms.

A. The real estate broker is unethical if she suggests to you that you should not have an attorney. To the contrary, the broker has a legal obligation to advise you that an atterney the prepresent you, at least at the closing is a good idea.
