New Hills survey to gauge voter apathy and attitudes

The Farmington Hills Voter Participation Committee wants to know why a greater number of residents aren't voting in local elections.

"We found we all had ideas of the people don't vote, but then we vote, said committee chairman David Haron. "We've been going in five or six different directions. But we had to know why we're going where we're going."

That's the basis of a voter attitude and participation survey the committee will have conducted within the next few months. Five marketing consulting lims have replied to the committee's request for proposals.

Bids for the survey range from \$3,000 to \$15,000. In mid-July, the nine member committee will review the proposals and recommend one of the five firms to the city council.

"Essentially, we want to know why you aren't voting," Haron said.
"Do people just have the feeling believ tote doesn't count? Is that the reason? Or is everything going well and they're happy?"

Haron said he hopes the survey will give the committee clues on how to promote elections and get voters to the polls. "Should we have more in the newspapers, on TV or in the streets. We don't know. That's why we're doing the survey."

THE COMMITTEE is hoping to

provide 25 questions with yes and no responses and another five to which respondents can offer more information. "How they (firm awarded bid) conducts the survey is pretty much up to them," Haron said.

While waiting for the survey, the committee is eyeing the Aug. 2 primary as a time to conduct a little experiment of its own. Signs encouraging voters to go to the polls will be placed at a couple of key precincts in the south and north ends of the city to determine if they generate a greater voter turnout. The precincts likely will be those with documented low voter turnouts.

"It's an unscientific poll to see if participation is greater," Haron said.

The voter participation committee was reactivated late last year before the Nov. 3 city council election to generate voter interest and increase turnout at the polls.

The committee faces some tough attitude changing considering the community's turnout history. In the 1987 Farmington Hills City Council election, 14 percent, or 5,989, voted out of 42,953 registered voters.
