ject, like an insect, and is preceived by their very acute hearing.

Most insect-eating bats can maneuver around a thread .10mm in diameter. A cluster of human hair is not easily confused with an insect!

UNTIL 1938 it was not known how bats maneuver at night. Then Donald Griffin confirmed a hypothesis that bats emit high-frequency sounds, like a sonar system.

Today most people know this fact and thus accept the adage "blind as a bat." Well, bats are not blind. They have good eyesight, but not good enough to detect a gnat at night.

Bats replace birds as insect eaters during the night. One gray bat may eat as many as 3,000 insects per night. A bat in your backyard is good for controlling insects. That is why

many people around the country are erecting batominiums. their claws. Place them in warm areas.

Just as people build bird houses, people are making the best little bat bouse in Michigan that they can make. They are simple to make and are installed about 12-15 feet high on the east side of a tree near a river, lake or marsh.

## How to avoid skin cancer

Do you recommend regular skin examinations for those of us who have fair skin? My mother, who was fair like me, developed skin cancer, when she was older. I would like to prevent this from happening to me.

Dear Mrs. T.:
Skin cancer is the most common of all cancers. The best way to prevent it is to stay out of the sun, Those who are most at risk (like you) have lair skin, fair hair and light-colored

You and others who are fair can reduce the risk of getting skin can-cer by establishing a monthly rou-tine whereby you carefully examine

Self-examination isn't difficult Just set a time (the first day of each month) and look for the following:

Fai • A sore that doesn't heal. Have are three weeks and if it crusts, bleeds

or oozes.

• A persistent reddish patch. If may be painful, or crust and itch; or it may not bother you at all.

• A smooth bump indented in the middle. The borders will be rolled; as it grows, blood vessels appear on the surfaces.
