July is often the month when visi-tors arrive and days need to be filled with activities. A visit to a garden or conservatory can be a rewarding ex-present disappointment.

when the company has departed, there is still work to be done on our property.

WEED CONTROL is an ongoing job, but if a routine is established, such as regular hoeing and cultivating to prevent weeds going to seed, next year the job may easier.

Hoeing and cultivating (and of course hand pulling) will control words, but miching is another method that also becelfs the plants by keeping moisture in and around them. Blodegradable materials such as compost, straw, hay, ground comobs, leaves and newspaper have an advantage because in the fall they can be turned under to improve soil



structure and add nutrients.

Another plus for mulches is they keep cropa cleaner by preventing muddy spatters and ground stains. They also prevent soil ercotion, pudding and crusting. Mulches not only slow the evaporation of water from the soil, they also prevent weed growth by smothering weed seedings and preventing light from reaching weed seeds near the soil surface. Usually this is most helpful in controlling small annual weeds. Large annual weeds and quackgrass and other perennial grasses may be a nuisance, but hoeing and cultivating will also keep them under control.

SOMETIMES AN ORGANIC mulch will provide an ideal home for slugs, which seem to be a universal problem. Slug baits or home remedies may work. My file contains several of these ideas; maybe one will work for you. Slugs love Purina Dog Chow Nugget; a non-alcobile: "near beer" may work; malt sugar in wa-

ter; or you may want to try a half, shell of a cantalope filled with very

shell of a cantalope filled with verysoapy water.
Other substances to use are: dry
marble dust, crushed shells, diatomaceous earth, coal cinders, broken
concrete, bulder's sand, Measurall
in granular form; and for soil low in
lift, wood ash. A simple remedy is to
pull back the mulch on a hot, sunny
day and let 'old soil' do the job.
