"Perfect Plant, Perfect Garden" (Summit Books \$24,95 hardcover, 314,95 trade paper) contains thorough descriptions of 200 of the hard-est and most easily cultivated plants and how to grow them. The author, Anne Scott James, is a veteran British gardener who includes personal insights and even some history about the plants.

The book is divided into three baste garden conditions — sunny, shady and container — with each category subdivided for normal, moist and dry conditions. Therefore it is easy for the reader to determine the condition in his location and turn to the appropiate chapter in the book for reference.

Landscaping" (\$24.95), is a large, hardcover volume that will be a worthy addition to your garden liberary. The text, by professionals, is clearly written in a manner that will make you feel that the experts are with you every step of the way.

Landscape planning, engineering fundamentals and problem solving; construction ideas; selecting and in-stalling ground covers, shrubs and trees; ideas for new sites and old ones that need sprucing up are all included.

How to begin to plan a design and how to install many of the structures you will be making, concerns for such things as for utility lines, right to the smallest detail, are addressed in the informative book.

ALL KINDS of situations that are connected to landscaping are included — watering, lighting, paths and walkways, pets, play areas, even

how to cut a brick and other construction tips.

Formal gardens, low-maintenance gardens and many others are considered. Storage areas, most often overlooked, can be incorporated successfully into outdoor living plans.

As a follow-up to the installation of the "structures," a plant guide features color photographs, growing-zone maps, habits and growing conditions for more than 400 ground covers, trees, shrubs, hedges, vines and lawn grasses, with instructions for planting and care.

This is a book that I believe will be used and loaned to friends to belp and encourage them after they see what a fine job you have done with your property.

It is slightly larger than the tradi-tional soft-cover Ortho books. "Cre-ative Home Landscaping" is the most complete book of this kind that I have seen in a long time. I give it a four-star rating.
