it approached Suva in the Fiji Islands July 23.

Marti's Journal and photographs

mail the words and photos to the
newspaper.

"They called us last Friday,
that's Saturday there," sald Judy
McWhirter, a friend and fellow

with our lives together from here."

"My husband and I were supposed to leave Thursday for Fiji to

# Census bureau job details

"A profile of the nation." That's low Dwight Dean, regional mana-ger, U.S. Bureau of the Census, de-scribes the national census.

According to Dean, painting this partialt of the nation's population will require 12,000 workers in Michigan when the census is taken in 1990. In addition, 1,000 temporary positions will be available in various parts of the state during the next 16 nionths, as the government tries to a seemble the most accurate mailling list possible.

Dean appears on the weekly Metrovision cable television pro-

gram "The Job Show" at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 4.
The Census Bureau will soon begin hirling personnel to help compile residential addresses, the first stage of census preparation. For a few months this fall, 700 people in rural regions of the southern half of the Lower Peninsula and selected cities in the north will be needed to work as enumerators. These jobs will pay from \$5.50 to \$8.25 an hour, plus mileage.

About 1,000 people will be needed to work from the spring of 1889 to the fall of 1990, doing similar work, primarily in cities.

Finally, at the time of the census (which takes place on April 1, 1990), 12,000 enumerators and crew leaders will be needed stakewide. The Michigan Employment Security Commission (MESC) will be taking applications for these positions on behalf of the Census Bureau.


