Highlights to enjoy in Academy's summer show

This year's summer show by recent Cranbrook Academy of Art graduates is, as usual, a mixed bag from all nine departments.

Exhibits range in size from two approximately 12-by-4-foot columns by Adjong Park of the filter department to a minimal streamlined telephone by Bill Goralski of the design department. Architecture: Terence Van Eslander's steel and plaster screen structure with movable panels combines elegance with an industrial flavor.

Ceramics: A cheeky, but sophisticated rabbit's head by Deborah McLellan Masouka, which is hollow and stands four feet high, won second prize earlier this year in Michigan Fine Arts '88, juried by Alice Ayocok. Bruce Winn's graceful teapot and cup are done in rich peacock hues.

Design: Ching-Liang Wang's sleek and simple plastic business computer with a black screen is accompanied by two photographs of the

seemingly effortless operating system. Color photographs of Lisa Krohn's manual telefax portransmitter show how she's turned something functional into an object of beauty.

Fiber: An eye-catching rug in handfelled wool with uneven edges and splashes of brilliant contemporary patterning on a black background is by Chad Hagan. Michey Spinale's Mexican pattern cloth is blue and white cotten with motifs within circles and fantasy Axtec beads.

Metalsmithing: Among the pleas-ing things in this category are Julie Stestreem's geometric gold and dia-mond pins arranged in an equally ex-quisite shell-like container of pink uncut, polished alabaster.

Painting: There are many differ-ent styles in evidence from figura-tive to drip-painting. A strong ab-stract, "Monsoon," by Chris Dim-mick, with a dominate red crescent shape, protrudes six inches from the wail.

Photography: The approach ranges from Annamaria's intriguing montage to Douglas Altenhead's impressive black and white shots documenting the process of land being cleared for building sites. Altenhead captures a feeling of desolation trees being felled and completed houses standing in an unlandscaped
