RICHARD, WHO has distributed copies of his hand-written notes, said he talked with Blanchard Wednesday, the day after Jackson's speech, at the Ritz Cariton Rotel in Atlanta delegation.

"The notes were made within a minute of the time Blanchard spoke," Richard said. "They're the kind of remarks that sear in your

memory, so I'm certain my recollec-tion was correct."
