Get rid of mildew

Summer is here and excessive moisture is a real problem. Because we have more appliances and gadgets that create moisture, and our houses are so airtight, the moisture has no place to escape.

According to Elaine Glasser, home economist for Cooperative Extension Service of Oakland County, several products control mildew, but use them with care. Chlorine bleach, for instance, is good for concrete floors and tiled walls but harmful to certain fabrics. And never mix chlorine with ammonia; the resulting fumes can be dangerous.

It is not enough just to get rid of mildew. It will return if you don't take care of the problem of dampness, warmth, lack of ventilation, dirt and a lack of light.

IN CLOSETS, lack of ventilation is the probable culprit. Leaving the closet door open can help, as can lowered doors. A bag of calcium chloride, activated alumina, silica gel or other dehumidifying products will also help.

The crawl space under a house often emits considerable moisture. Spread layers of polyurethane or heavy roofing paper on the ground. Mildew often occurs on siding. After a rain, the shrubbery blocks out the sun, and wood stays wet. If there are no leaks, assume the shrubbery or other vegetation is at fault. Remove or trim it.

Exhaust fans in kitchens and bathrooms often can provide ventilation to deter mildew. Finally, make sure your clothes dryer is vented to the outside.
