O'NEILL LIBRARY — By a voice of 158 for and 239 against, the House rejected a bill to provide a \$12.2 million taxpayer contribution toward construction of a Boston College library dedicated to former House Speaker Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill, D-Mass.

The bill (HR 3661) sought to forgive the remainder of a federal library construction loan received by the college in 1981, before it announced it would name the library after O'Neill and accept his papers. Supporter Silvio Conte, R-Mass, said, "This is a worthy bill. It is not pork."

Opponent Thomas Petri, R-Wis., said the bill is "pure pork, and it's the wrong way to establish a memorial."


