CATCHING THE name-that-grape bug was yet another winemaker from Santa Cruz, the creative and somewhat eccentric Ken Burnap of Santa Cruz Mountain. In 1980, he cleased a 1978 Duriff (that's the promised three names now), a massive effort (as all his wines tend to be) that came from a grape we had thought all along to be the Petite Sirah.




