

Eligible families can get free food

Butter and flour will be distributed free to income-eligible Oakland County residents 1-3 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 8, at St. Alexander Church, 27815 Shilohville, Farmington Hills. Income-eligible Oakland County residents who have not already registered may register the day of the distribution. They must bring proof of total household income for the last 90 days, their Social Security card and personal identification.

EACH ELIGIBLE person is given a new USDA Surplus Commodity Food Registration Card with a registration number and the distribution site that the person must attend every other month between Oct. 1, 1988, and Sept. 30, 1989.

This card must be presented to the clerk for verification every time the person receives the commodities. Registration does not guarantee receipt of commodity food each time. Distribution is on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Income eligibility is based on the 130 percent of the federal poverty guidelines for people younger than 60 and 160 percent of the poverty guidelines for people 60 and older.

Senior citizens (60 and over) who attend a senior center to pick up their commodities should contact the center for pickup date and time. Also, homebound seniors should contact their nearest senior center to register for homebound delivery. Homebound people younger than 60 should call West Oakland Field Services, 666-3974.

Little Caesars franchisees from 39 communities throughout Michigan will welcome the torch runners at their restaurants. The Olympic-style torch will be carried night and day through the state on the Torch Run's main route.

In support of this marathon effort, police officers from around the state will participate in community-based team Torch Runs. Each officer is responsible for collecting pledges from members of the community to raise money for Special Olympics.

The main Torch Run began Monday in Copper Harbor and will continue east across the upper peninsula across the Mackinac Bridge.

Seminar shows employers how to fight drugs

Whether it's a major problem or not, employers should be aware of the signs of drug and alcohol problems among their employees.

That's the thrust behind a seminar scheduled for 8-10 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 5, at the Alexander Hamilton Insurance Co. of America, 33045 Hamilton Blvd., Farmington Hills. Cost is \$15 for printed materials.

The seminar is a cooperative venture between the Farmington-Farmington Hills Chamber of Commerce and the Farmington Hills Police Department's nine-month-old Crime Prevention Advisory Committee.

"It's aimed at business — substance abuse in the workplace. It was an appropriate program for the chamber to sponsor," chamber executive director Jody Soronen said.

Interested employers may register for the October seminar with the chamber, 33201 Grand River, Farmington, phone 474-3440.

Whether there's a big substance abuse problem in Farmington-area businesses is unknown. But if a problem does crop up in the future, employers will be prepared to handle it, Farmington Hills police Lt. Richard Murphy said.

"There really hasn't been a lot of information provided to people on what to do, how to handle a drug or alcohol problem," said Murphy, a committee member. "They're going to talk about alcohol, the whole spectrum of drugs."

THOUGH THIS isn't the first drug education program sponsored by the committee, it is the first to stress

employer responsibilities and rights, according to advisory committee member Angel Bakos.

"The whole point is to have employers know what to look for and how to deal with it," Soronen added.

General information on the nation's continually growing substance abuse problem will be provided by Farmington Hills police Chief William Dwyer. The legal ramifications will be discussed by attorney Timothy Kanny, a former Wayne County assistant prosecutor and an advisory committee member.

Substance abuse symptoms, statistics, solutions and available resources will be explained by Jan Coler, director of the Maple Grove Training Institute, Henry Ford Hospital, West Bloomfield.

The crime prevention task force was formed in January 1988 with members comprised of a cross-section of the residential and business community. The committee's first program, "Say No To Drugs," in April, sparked a yearlong drug awareness campaign.

The campaign's three-pronged attack on substance abuse calls for strong enforcement, effective rehabilitation and in-depth educational programs for all members of the community.

The October business seminar is part of the committee's 19-point action plan designed to educate and fight substance abuse in the community. The committee is considering a seminar for employers in the Farmington area in 1989, Bakos said.
