

Van Vleck's lucky streak comes to halt

Playoff decides O&E winner

BUT ALL STREAKS come to an end. Van Veck: seemingly had the tournament wrapped up on both the first and second holes, but it was his opponents who pulled off astounding hosts to stay alive. Then on the third hole — the easiest of the three—bad fortune descended upon Van Vleck like the sudden storm that swept toward the course.

And Hedges took full advantage, laying his steadlest glof of the overtime to claim his first O&E champinashp.

"I thought the party was over," said Van Vleck after the first over-time hole. "These guys came up with a couple of great shots."

They did just that. But there's need for an saterisk here; for now, Hedges is the "provisional champion." Moments after completing the playoff, the storm came, forcing a wash-out of the afternoon session.

Hedges' victory surprised him as much as anyone else. The Birmingham Groves graduate started the playoff in trouble and stayed there on each of the first two holes.

"I was up against the wall," he said afterward. "My wedge saved me. To be honest with you, it thought I was out of it on the second hole."

IT TOOK a near-perfect shot to get Hedges — and Smith, for that matter — to the second playof hole. Hedges left his second shot on the par-five, 475-yard first hole sliting in the deep rough just past the bunker, 15 yards short of the green. Van Vleck was on the green 20 feet from an eagle.

Hedges' chip was perfect, rolling to within six inches of the almost-impossibly placed pin (on a mound, three feet inside the right fringe). Smith also had a big problem; his second shot was right of the green, with a bunker lying between. He hade not become, guthing to within 4 feet.

Van Vleck two-putted, giving all three birdies and taking them to hole No. 2.

AGAIN, TROUBLE loomed for Hedges and Smith. Van Vieck's tee shot on the tough par-four, 403-yard dogleg-left was right at the bend. "I got lucky and had a good lie (in the woods)," he said, "and I hit tigood."




