ers, after Donna O'Brien's three-point play and Kim Gurecki's layup, got within 37-33 on Clear's free throw with 4% minutes left. But then North's shooting tailed off, and the Rocks finally locked up the win on Srah Ruete's basket and free throws by Estey and Ly-diu White, making the score 44-35 with 17 seconds remaining.
