# Firemen give life-saving shocks with defibrillator

Bersche said, "This simplifies the whole process. The greatest percentage of heart patients can be saved by this."

The defibrillator will provide the patient with three shocks to restore the proper heart rhythm. If nothing happens, the EMTs will try cardiopulmonary resuscitation to try to circulate the patient's blood. When ambulance paramedics arrive, they can take medical care a step further for the patient by either using the paddles or providing medication, Bersche said.

THE AUTOMATIC defibrillators in no way eliminate the patient's need to be taken to a hospital and put into a critical care or cardiac unit. The defibrillators are designed to buy the patient time until the advanced-trained paramedics arrive on the scene, he said.

Though the fire department will be better equipped to respond to cardiac problems, EMTs are urging residents — particularly those with family members who have heart problems — to learn CPR.

"Public education effort is the biggest hurdle we have to overcome," said firefighter John Wells, in charge of a public education effort for the new program.

Eighty-percent of all cardiac arrests happen in the morning at home. That means another family member must act quickly. Without delay, an emergency call to the fire department should be made. Then CPR must be started immediately, Wells said.

"We want them to recognize the events. And we want them to call immediately — even if it turns out to be nothing. Early recognition of any medical event is correlated to treatment," Wells said. "If the family member provides CPR, it makes our chances better to save the patient."

PLANNING FOR installation and use of the defibrillators began with work by a 15-member committee. The committee had to consider purchasing, training, public education and medical procedures and working with the hospital.

A Botsford emergency physician will be working with the department as medical adviser. "It's basically responsible for how this program runs," Bersche said, about the physician, who was unavailable for comment.

Data will be gathered each time the equipment is used. "At a future time, we will look at the program — medically, is it working? Medically, isn't it working?" Bersche added.

do safety-related improvements to older buildings. They say such improvements can be done out of operating funds, but it will be a scattered approach that will take longer and cost more.

Anderson said he would like to hear a realistic report on safety problems in school buildings.

"I think now they've allowed rumors of unsafe schools, but they say they (the buildings) all meet the standards. We want them to come clean on that," he added.

Anderson said he also wants the board to pledge to full disclosure of important figures, such as its capital building account, which was not included in a district newsletter with other financial information. Flanagan said in earlier reports the district already planned to include such information in future years.

TRUSTEES are expected to react to loss of the bond issue Tuesday night and plan to schedule a future study session to delve into options

for the district, according to board president Jack Cotton.

Last week, Flanagan listed several options the district can consider: • Going back to voters again, no sooner than this winter, to try for additional debt mileage,

• Again discussing elementary school boundaries,

• Consider authorizing additional operating millage to handle the facility improvement portion of the plan. Flanagan said the district could do this immediately.

## Out-of-district students appeal tuition

Out-of-district students who were allowed to continue attending Farmington schools for one more year will again appeal to the school board Tuesday evening because they have received tuition bills.

At least seven out-of-district stu-

dents have attended school in Farmington — some for more than eight years — thinking they lived in the district. Recent computerization of the bus routing system in the district identified them as out-of-district pupils.

The school board voted earlier this month to grant them all a one-year reprieve, but did not address the issue of tuition. The mother of one student said they had received a tuition bill and planned to appeal to the board.
