Bersche sald. "This simplifies the whole process. The greatest percentage of heart patients can be saved by this."

this." The defibrillator will provide the patient with three shocks to restore the proper heart rhythm. If nothing happens, the EMTs will try cardiopolimonary resuscitation to try to circulate the patient's blood. When ambulance paramedics arrive, they can take medical care a step forther for the patient by either using the paddles or providing medication, Bersche said.

THE AUTOMATIC delibriliators in no way eliminate the patient's need to be taken to a hospital and put into a critical care or cardiac unit. The dilibriliators are designed to buy the patient time until the advanced-trained paramedics arrive on the scene, he said

said. Though the fire department will be better equipped to respond to cardiac problems, EMTs are urging residents—particularly those with family members who have heart problems—to learn CFB "Public education effort is the biggest burdle we have to overcome," said direfighter John Wells, in charge of a public education effort for the new program.

Eighty-percent of all cardiac arrests happen in the morning at home. That means another family member must act quickly. Without delay, an emergency call to the fire department should be made. Then CPR must be started immediately, Wells said.

"We want them to recognize the events. And we want them to call immediately — even if it turns out to be nothing. Early recognition of any medical event its correlated to treatment," Wells said. "If the family member provides CPR, it makes our chances better to save the patient."

PLANNING FOR installation and use the defi-brillators began with work by a 15-member commit-tee. The committee had to consider purchasing, train-ing, public education and medical procedures and working with the hospital.

A Botsford emergency physician will be working with the department as medical adviser. "He's basically responsible for how this program runs," Bersche sald, about the physician, who was unavailable for


