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police/fire calls

Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls, and court cases reported during the past week:

• JUVENILE SUSPECT HELD
A 15-year-old Farmington Hills boy is being held in Children's Village in Pontiac in lieu of \$20,000 cash/surety bond in connection with the burglary of five apartment units and the theft of one car, Farmington Hills police said.

After formally advising the suspect of the charges facing him, an Oakland County Probate Court Juvenile Division referee Wednesday set cash/surety bond at \$5,000 per count. The boy, through his attorney, waived his right to a preliminary hearing.

Ten percent cash bond must be posted to gain release pending the next scheduled hearing Sept. 28, said Sgt. Charles Nebus of the Farmington Hills Police Department.

Four units at Greenhill Apartments, Nine Mile and Halsted, were broken into Sept. 17. Money, a purse and a wallet were taken in a string of break-ins, which occurred between 2 and 3 a.m. while the residents were asleep. Most of the stolen property was recovered near the boy's residence, Nebus said.

One unit at Newport Creek Apartments, Eight Mile and Gill, was broken into and Sept. 13. A car also was stolen. It was later found abandoned, Nebus said.

Investigative work led to the suspect's arrest the afternoon of the Greenhill break-ins, Nebus said.

• WARRANT ISSUED
Detroit Red Wings player Joe Kocur, 23, is charged with assault and battery in connection with an argument and an alleged arm punching incident that involved a 22-year-old woman outside a Farmington Hills dance spot Aug. 23.

The argument and the incident in

which Kocur allegedly punched the Farmington Hills woman's arm took place in the parking lot of Mr. Sports, 30860 Orchard Lake Road, Farmington Hills police said.

District Judge Margaret Schaeffer of Farmington signed a criminal arrest warrant against Kocur Thursday. Kocur, a West Bloomfield resident, is to be arraigned once the Red Wings return from a preseason road trip this Wednesday. He faces up to 90 days in jail and a \$500 fine if convicted on the misdemeanor charge, police said.

Kocur denies the charges and intends to plead innocent, according to his attorney, Al Adolis of Troy.

• FELONY CHARGES
A 21-year-old Rochester Hills man faces felony charges after a hunting knife with an 11-inch blade and nine baggies of marijuana were found inside a car during a traffic stop on Eight Mile and Grand River Sept. 19.

Arrested Sept. 20 before Magistrate James Brady of Farmington, the man pleaded not guilty to delivery and manufacture of marijuana and carrying a concealed weapon. He faces up to four years in prison on the first count and up to five years in prison on the second count if convicted. Cash/surety bond was set at \$1,500 pending a preliminary exam in 47th District Court.

• VIOLATION ISSUED
A 34-year-old West Bloomfield man was cited under a Farmington Hills city ordinance for exposing himself to a 17-year-old girl as she walked by a school bus stop near Polo Club Apartments, Nine Mile and Haggerty, Sept. 7.

The license plate number of the car the perpetrator was in, coupled with good investigative work, led to the man's arrest, said Sgt. Charles Nebus of the Farmington Hills Po-

lice Department.

Two white gold rings valued at \$1,500 were reported stolen from a patient at Oak Hill Care Center, 34225 Grand River, Sept. 9-11.
