## Bigger show demands larger quarters

Farmington Community Center's annual Arts and Crafts Show moves to Oakland Community College's Orchard Ridge Campus this year. With more than 100 juried artists showing their work and the increasing number of patrons the show continues to draw, another spot had to be found.

Now in its 16th year, the committee of jurors continue to select the

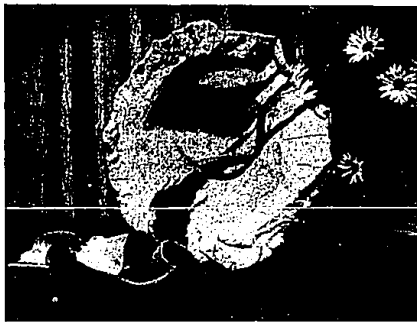
