



the attention of the clerk at the time it is rung up, the consumer is entitled to the difference of the marked price and the price the cash register rung

If the consumer goes home and finds the mistake, the consumer is callided to the difference plus 10 times that difference not less than \$1 or more than \$2.5. For example, if an item is marked \$1.39, but the register rung it up at \$1.69, the consumer would be entitled to 30 cents plus 10 times the amount of the mistake. In this case,

the consumer would be entitled to \$3.30.

"SOME OF the stores have really

"SOME OF the stores have really found it convenient, other stores have found it's not cost effective." Balley staf. "But for the consumer, it's been wonderful." One reason for the law was to combat the "worst-case scenario" where a business would change the computer pricing during peak periods to reap higher profits.

Some items, like fresh fruit and enny candy, do not need to be individually priced, Balley said. The list of exempt items should be available at the store manager's office.
