Michigan's employment picture remained fairly stable from August to September as the state's seasonally adjusted Jobless rate edged down to 7.3 percent, said the Michigan Employment Security Commission. ment had small increases in September while unemployment registered a slight decline."

According to estimates prepared by the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics, Michigan's unemployment total fell by 3,000 to 334,000. In August, the jobbes rate had been 7.4 percent, with 337,000 out of work.
