Harrison grad toes line for Chippewas

There was a lot on the line when Central Michigan met Eastern Michigan Saturday night at Ryncars Stadium – including Dave Delekta. Delekta, 6-feet-3 and 255 poundings delentaive line for CMU. He and the rest of his defensive mates made the night a memorable one by socking EMU 20-5.

This was more than a clash of lotrastate football rivals. The Hurosternec champions and, together with CMU (and Western Michigan and Ball State), were tied for the MAC lead. Which made this mid-season game a pivotal one.

As Delekta pointed out, "We had a lot of incentive for this. Having that (state) rivalry is a lot of incentive. And this was a very important game for us."

The Chippewas played like it. They dominated both lines of scrimmage. EMU managed just 93 yards rushing and 130 passing, to CMU's 160 rushing and 145 passing.

BUT EQUALLY important, it was the Chips' second consecutive win over the Hurons and the second straight game in which they limited EMU to one touchdown. As coaches are fond of saying, defense wins ball games.

Which is what Deletka likes to provide. The junior from Farming-ton Hills (Harrison) was in on 30 tac-kies in '87, starting all 11 games. With the three assists he had Satur-day, Deletka has 18 tackles this sea-son for the 4-1 Chips.

Deletka wasn't officially credited with a sack against EMU — CMU had three — but he did his job, pres-suring Huron quarterback Tom Sulli-van constantly.

DELETKA'S SUCCESS is hardly a surprise to his coach, Herb Deremod. "We try to put good abletes on defense," Deremod said, "Dave fits that mold. Sure, he's gotten bigger and stronger (Delekta weighed 215 as a senior at fiarrison), which has helped him.

"He's also gotten very physical. Ho's always been a very active play-er, even when he played for (Harri-son coach) John Herrington."

Deletka is best against the run, ac-cording to Deremodi, but he's "made great strides against the pass, too." The strides Deletka is most proud of, however, are his team's. "We have confidence in ourselves," he said. "We believe in one another. It's not a cocky kind of confidence. East-ers's a lough team. For us, this (win) is just one step in the right direc-tion."
