MADD calls youth for poster contest

Area youngsters can win up to \$1,000 and a trip to New York by entering a poster contest with the theme "Drive Sober - Drive Smart." The contest is sponsored by MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Driving) and National Car Rental System, the first in its field to support an anti-drunk driving campaign. The contest is coordinated locally by Oakland

County MADD and Farmington Families in Action.

The contest is open to all youth from first through eighth grades. Deadline for entry is Nov. 4 when all entries will be picked up in the child's school office by a committee headed by Cindy Helisek, who is a member of both MADD and Farmington Families in Action.

Posters can be either 11 x 17 inches or 18 x 20 inches, but to be eligible the theme "Drive Sober - Drive Smart" must be used. The contestant's name, address, phone number, age, school and grade are to be put on the back of the poster.

School winners in three age categories will win framed certificates and ribbons. District winners will win from \$10 to \$50. County winners will win from \$25 to \$150.

The national winners will receive their prizes at an award ceremony and press conference in New York City, the first week in April 1989. MADD's mission is to mobilize victims and their allies to establish the public conviction that impaired driving is unacceptable and criminal in order to promote corresponding public policies, programs and personal accountability.
