Brandon L. Glod of Farmington and Thomas B. Bodner of Livonia, both 20, were charged with assault with intent to rob while armed in connection with the incident. The fellowy offense carries a maximum life prison sentence upon conviction.

BOTH MEN stood mute at arraignment Oct. 13 before Redford's 17th District Judge Robert Brang, who entered a not guilty plea on behalf of both defendants.

Bodner and Glod were being held in the Redford bockup after failing to post \$10,000 bond each. They are scheduled to appear Tuesday, Oct. 25 for a district court preliminary examination on the charges.
