## Cable TV show to focus on problem of adult illiteracy

About 800,000 adults in Michigan would probably have trouble reading this article. That figure, based on the number of adults who have less than a ninth grade education, may only hint at the real depth of the problem.

"A good percentage of the people who've come through our literacy program in the last four years have high school diplomas. And they're still reading below the fourth grade level," said Marsha DeVergilio, a literacy project coordinator in southeast Michigan.

"If you work, your job is in jeopardy, your life is not complete without reading."

For some people, even everyday reading tasks at home are an almost impossible chore. Bev Ponnanen, who began taking adult basic education classes four years ago, remembers the heartbreak of not being able to read bedtime stories to her children.

"You feel like you're stupid — like there's nobody else out there who can't read," said Ponnanen, who,

with DeVergilio and other guests, will discuss the problem of illiteracy on "The Job Show," at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 3, on Metrovision cable Channel 12.

Ponnanen, who now knows the satisfaction of being able to read stories to her children and letters from friends, offers this simple advice to others with reading difficulties: "Just get tired of being illiterate. You can do something about it."
