Holocaust anniversary to be marked

B'nai B'rith, the world's largest Jewish organization, with B'nai B'rith Women, the Jewish Welfare Federation and Jewish Community Council is sponsoring a dramatic commemorative event to mark the 50th anniversary of the night the Holocaust took its first genocidal turn.

On the night of Nov. 9, 1938, Nazi hoodlums went on a government-incited, anti-Jewish rampage all over Germany. Synagogues were burned, Jewish men, women and children were dragged from their homes and beds to face beatings, torture and murder. The destruction was so great that the night became known as "Kristallnacht" — the night of broken glass.

To ensure that we remember and learn from history — so that we may prevent possible genocides in the future — B'nai B'rith is sponsoring "Lights of Remembrance," said Bobbie Levine, regional director, Metropolitan Detroit Council.

Throughout the night of Nov. 9-10, 1988, from dusk to dawn, the lights of the sanctuaries and exteriors of synagogues and churches all over the United States will remain lit, in solemn witness to the past, as well as symbolizing hope for a future free of racism and anti-Semitism.
