

## Marlins qualify for state

Farmington Hills Mercy will make a return trip to the Class A girls cross country meet after qualifying Saturday in the Grosse Pointe South regional.

The Marlins were third with 78 points, finishing behind No. 3-rated Dearborn Edsel Ford (32) and runner-up Redford Union (74).

Mercy's Brigitte Dery earned all-region honors for the second straight year, placing 14th in 21:30. Teammate Noelle Gates

copped the same accolade with her 15th-place finish and 21:32 time. The top 15 runners are designated as all-region performers.

The Marlins were able to qualify for the state meet again when a trio of runners ran together in a pack that saw Wendy Knight finish 17th, Carrie Goebble 20th and Sande Taylor 22nd.

Knight covered the course in 21:55, Goebble 22:07 and Taylor 22:12. In addition, Mercy's Kelly Moore was 34th (23:08) and Debbi Cool 35th (23:24).

The Marlins were 25th in Class A last year, and coach Gary Servais hopes his team can improve on that, especially since Dery, Knight, Cool and Taylor are veterans of state-meet competition.

Gates and Cool, both seniors, will be running in their final race, but this isn't the last hurrah for the Marlins as a team, Servais believes. The rest of the top seven will return next year.

Usually, only three teams from each region go to state, but Berkeley also qualified based on a rarely-invoked rule that says a team with four runners in the top 10 can advance, also.

## Individual runners get state berths

While their teams didn't qualify for the state meets, a number of area cross country runners will compete as individuals Saturday.

Farmington schools had four athletes place among the top 10 in the boys and girls Class A races at Howell.

North Farmington's Lisa Rives was third in the girls competition, and Jennifer Kiel of Farmington was fourth.

In a near repeat of the Western Lakes Activities Association girls meet, Walled Lake Central's Colleen Yuhn won the race in 19:19. Rives ran 19:41 and Kiel was timed at 19:49.

In the WLA meet a week ago, Yuhn was first, Rives second and Kiel third in 19:25, 19:30 and 19:52, respectively.

FARMINGTON'S DUO of Ben Goba and Brad Moore will represent the Falcons, who were eighth in the state team race last year, in the individual contest.

Goba was sixth and Moore seventh in the regional with 16:50 and 16:51 times. The top 10 runners not affiliated with one of the three qualifying schools advance to the state individual race.

Canton's Brian Beach will join Goba and Moore in that event after placing 18th in the Howell regional with a 17:04 time.

In the Class B regional in Mount Clemens, the Harrison boys were 12th, but Jeff Barringer qualified for the state meet at Willow Metro Park, finishing among the top eight runners.

Plymouth Christian senior Randy Gauthier continued a school tradition when he qualified a second straight year for the Class D meet, scheduled for Saturday in Frankmun.

Gauthier was 33rd in the regional at Royal Oak Kimball with a 19:05 time. He was 21st in the state last year, running an 18:53 race.

"The (regional) time was sort of slow for him, but it was enough to qualify," Christian coach Steve Bauslaugh said. "We're hoping for a better time next week, and the course makes a difference, too."

This is the fourth consecutive year the Eagles have sent a runner to state. Jeff Bennett did so in 1985 and Chris Snider in 1986.

All coaches like to have their teams in peak form when tournament time comes up at the end of the season. So Jerry Abraham must be pretty pleased with his Madonna College volleyball squad.

Madonna rolled through five matches last weekend at the St. Mary's (Ind.) College Tournament, capturing the title with a 9-15, 15-7, 15-3 win over University of Michigan-Dearborn Saturday.

The championship gave Madonna 13 wins in its last 15 matches, and an overall 25-10 record, with the NAIA districts scheduled for this weekend.

Triggering the Madonna triumph was sophomore Marie Cervantes, from Redford Bishop Borgess. Cervantes had 67 kills in 107 attacks to earn journey MVP and NAIA District 23 player of the week honors.

Madonna opened the tournament by beating St. Mary's 15-4, 15-12

and Defiance (Ohio) 15-8, 15-6 Friday. On Saturday, its wins came against UNI-D 15-16, 15-11, 15-12 and, in the semifinals, Siena Heights 15-13, 15-3.

Junior Wendy Spencer (from Schoolcraft College) added 38 kills in the tournament, sophomore Kristy McFadden (Borgess) had 37 kills and freshman Penny Baker provided steady setting.

Freshmen Jenny Sladewski (Livonia Stevenson) and Wendy Wesala and sophomores Rosanne Krach and Joy Pitrore contributed solid defense, while freshmen Lisa Dreski (Borgess) and Kim Blaznek combined for seven blocks against UNI-D.
